



#### ICE Safety Guidelines for Bucks Students and Faculty

Bucks faculty and students received an email early last week in regards to the current ICE situation taking place nationwide. Bucks Community College Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Samuel P. Coleman IV urged students and teachers alike to contact on campus Security & Safety if they suspect not only ICE agents on campus, but also impersonations of ICE patrol or of any other similar agencies.

This comes after the recent change in immigration President Trump implemented since taking office back in January. The Trump administration announced they would allow federal immigration agencies raids and arrests in churches, hospitals, and schools. These shelter places, also known as Protected Areas, was a policy that had been in place since the Obama administration back in 2011.

The email sent by Vice President Coleman urges anyone on campus who comes into contact with an ICE agent to contact security, to not share any information with the officers, and to tell them to wait in an outside area until the on-campus security officer arrives.

Although the email mentions the campus has not experienced any immigration or ICE situations of any sort, it does reveal that other colleges have.

In early February a Temple University student was charged with an alleged impersonation of an ICE officer on the Temple University North Philly campus. He was seen walking around campus, trying to enter buildings, and even going off campus to a local Insomnia cookie – all while being recorded by a fellow student and friend of his.

Temple University made



an official statement stating "any student found responsible for this conduct will be subject to disciplinary action under the Student Conduct Code, up to and including expulsion."

It is unknown what would happen to a Bucks student who attempts to impersonate a federal agent, but the email does ensure that Security & Safety officers are trained and know how to verify credentials and warrants while also knowing how to manage such situations.

The Department of Homeland Security made an official statement recently dismantling the decade long guidance for immigrants saying, "This action empowers the brave men and woman in CBP (Custom Border Patrol) and ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) to enforce our immigration laws and catch criminal aliens - including murderers and rapists - who have illegally come into

our country. Criminals will no longer be able to hide in America's schools and churches to avoid arrests."

These protected areas, also known as "sensitive locations" were restricted from any form of enforcement actions, unless for a very specific circumstance where prior approval is obtained.

Schools around the country have seen an influx in absenteeism from students as fear has taken over households. According to The Migration Policy Institute, an estimated ¬¬733,000 school children are undocumented or come from undocumented parents. Many of these parents fear what could happen to their children if these harsh Immigration laws continue.

Just last week, an 11-yearold girl named Jocelynn Rojo Carranza took her own life at her home in Gainesville, Texas after weeks of relentless bullying. The young girl's mother says her daughter began to receive insults from her former classmates stating her and her family were going to be taken away by ICE for being "illegal immigrants". Marbella Carranza, the girl's mother claimed she had no idea her daughter was being bullied at school. She was only made aware of the situation after the incident took place when she went to the school looking for answers.

An article from CNN stated that at her funeral service, the church deacon Gelasio Garcia stated, "she didn't know how to understand the things that happen in the world".

Most children do not understand the extent of the situation going on around with these new laws which is why schools around the country have been sending out emails similar to the one emailed to Bucks County Community College students and faculty last week.

Emails like the one sent to the Bucks County Community College community have been sent to schools all around Pennsylvania, especially Philadelphia due to the city's Federal Detention Center becoming a facility for ICE detainees.

On average about 973 people have been detained by ICE every day since Trump took office. Although the Trump Administration insists they are focusing on violent criminals, many should take caution as anyone could be caught in the cross fire.

This could be a heavy topic to discuss for many students, so if anyone feels like they need to talk to someone about this, do not hesitate to contact the Bucks Counseling Service Center. Services are free, confidential, and available at all campuses for currently enrolled Bucks students

A sea of green covered the streets of South Philadelphia and Center City Friday as an estimated \$1 million Eagles fans cheered on the Super Bowl 59 champions. The Eagles were all smiles as team buses traveled northbound on Broad Street enroute to the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

Boisterous fans busted out Eagles chants and sang the Birds fight song as their heroes tossed green beads to fans along the parade route. Emotion ran high at all points of the parade.

Colin Haury, 19, of Wilmington, wasn't a football fan when the Eagles beat the Patriots in Minneapolis in 2018. However, Haury, is a diehard now. "It seems like forever since we last won a Super Bowl," Haury said. "But last time I didn't know much about football but this is incredible. E-A-G-L-E-S, Eagles!"

Bobby Minelli, 54, of South Philadelphia, has a different perspective. Minelli spent much of his life waiting for his beloved Birds to win it all and he attended his second parade within a decade.





"This means the world to me," Minelli said. "I go to as many games as possible and its just unreal to have another parade so soon. We waited so long to win a Super Bowl and now just seven-years later we won another one. Its unreal."

Minelli was wise enough to catch the festivities from Broad and Morris streets, which is blocks from his house. Only locals and savvy fans know that the start of the parade route is much less populated than City Hall. Trent Halsey, 23, of Willow Grove was wise enough to hang out just off of Morris street and was rewarded with a high five from massive left tackle Jordan Mailata.

"I'll never forget this moment," Halsey said. "One of my favorite players came over and celebrated with me. Its just awesome."

Chris Wilson, 29, of Norristown, was on the edge of losing his voice at City Hall since he was screaming at his favorite players as they passed. Wilson, clad in a Jalen Carter jersey, was ecstatic. "You wear the green and you die for this team." Wilson said. "This is my favorite team in sports and I'll never forget how they

destroyed Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs."

The Eagles beat the Kansas City Chiefs 40-22 in New Orleans but the score doesn't indicate how Philadelphia dominated the favored team that was going for a three-peat. The Eagles led 34-0 and it was obvious that a huge celebration in Philadelphia was on the horizon.

"We can't do without the fans," Eagles quarterback Jalen Hurts said from the Philadelphia Museum of Art. "We can't do without the fans. We all appreciate you. We love you."

It was the first time Hurts visited the museum by design. Hurts is well aware that the steps were featured in the iconic film Rocky since Sylvester Stallone, who played fictional Philly fighter Rocky Balboa ran up the stairs while preparing for a heavyweight title fight. "I told myself that when I got drafted that I wouldn't come to the Rocky steps until I won the championship and now here we are," Hurts said.

It's appropriate since the Eagles were Super Bowl underdogs and Rocky wasn't the favorite during his title fight.

But the Eagles are the odds-on favorite to repeat next season. Perhaps there will be back-to-back parades in the City of Brotherly Love. "That would be awesome," Nicky Falsano, 28, of Fairmount said. "Let's meet back here again next year. Same time, same place. Go Birds!"

on Tuesday Feb. 18. The Upper Bucks Campus will host there's on Wednesday Feb. 19, and the Newtown campus on Tuesday Feb. 25 and Wednesday Feb. 26. These events run between 9:30am -1pm.

Don't hesitate to stop by, ask questions, and even get help setting up an account with "Scholarship Universe". The platform is designed to be a one stop shop for all scholarship needs. The goal is to make applying for scholarships "accessible and not intimidating" said Julianne Theodoropulos, our scholarship coordinator. These scholarships are just one of the initiatives Bucks has taken to help support their students.

These funds are available to current and even upcom-

ing Bucks students. When applying to the Bucks college, specific scholarships money will be applicable for your upcoming semester. Unfortunately, these "inhouse" grants are only available for covering the cost of courses at Bucks'. Scholarship Universe doesn't have Bucks' specific grants, but there is a plethora of awards available to all students. So, even if this is your last semester attending Bucks, Scholarship Universe is still a great place to access all things scholarship related.

During our spring 2021 semester, was when Scholarship Universe was incorporated into our program. "We want to demystify the process of applying," said Theodoropulos. The program matches scholarships that the applicant qualifies for. All one has to do is submit the necessary requirements, which may include a writing piece or a letter of recommendation.

There are more than 130 different scholarship funds. Which have been donated by involved community members, alumni's families, and even the Tyler family; the family whose land the Newtown campus sits upon. These donors understand the financial struggles that come along with being a student, and they want to help you succeed.

"Don't be intimidated and don't second guess

yourself," said Theodoropulos. Even if you don't see yourself as being "worthy" enough for a scholarship, you never know until you try. You could be missing out on anywhere from \$600-\$3000 in grants

\$3000 in grants. These are more than just funds, when Theodoropulos joined the program, she worked to connect with donors and their families to bring these scholarships to life through telling their stories. By doing so she's made it possible to feel more connected to your scholarship and inspired for all the future holds. She said, "all we have is our story". Which is why it's so impactful to be able to read these donor's stories.

Eric Mintel spent 32 years making a living being a jazz musician. Now, he is in the pursuit of knowledge of the supernatural, paranormal, and the further unknown.

On Friday, March 8, 2025, from 12-7:00 PM, Bucks County Community College is holding the second annual ParaCon in the Zlock Performing Arts Center at the Newtown Campus, hosted by Eric Mintel and Dominic Satelle, with numerous other fantastic guests, including Dave Schrader, who can be seen on the paranormal T.V. series "The Holzer Files," and "Ghosts of Devil's Perch."

Before hosting ParaCon, Eric Mintel made his living as a jazz musician for 32 years, and was quite successful while doing so.

Along with playing at the famed Kennedy Center in Philadelphia, Mintel and his quartet have performed at the White House for both George Clinton and Barack Obama, as well as the United Nations.

"I have been interested in

"To be honest with you, I'm pretty grateful that we are in a time now where


people can be honest with their experiences with the paranormal without being labeled, quite frankly, as crazy," says Mintel.

The Disney College Program, is a work opportunity available to students throughout the United States. Potential applicants must be 18+, and have taken college credits in order to apply. The application was a multi step process. I first had to complete an online questionnaire where I detailed past work experience. From there, I was instructed to complete a web-based interview- essentially, an online personality test. The final step of the interview process is the dreaded phone interview. At a predetermined time, a disney

recruiter calls, and spends roughly 20 minutes going over what role you might be best suited for.

From here, the process is streamlined. If memory serves, I found out that I was accepted about a month after my phone interview. Roughly one month before move in day, you find out what role you were assigned. They all showed extreme eagerness on the field as they supported their team through the season.

The Men's season did face challenges to overcome, after speaking with Head Coach Justin Burroughs he expressed the availability

## Is an Asteroid Collision Possible in 2032?

Global planetary defense procedures were put into effect after a 100 meter-wide asteroid was observed with a telescope and has a 1.3% chance of smashing into Earth's surface causing deadly and irreversible damage on December 22, 2032.

An automated telescope in Chile spotted what is now called "Asteroid 2024 YR4" and has reached the top of many impact risk lists throughout the United States of America and all throughout Europe.

This asteroid is currently 27 million miles away and will come close to about 66,000 on the December 22, 2032 date.

According to the Guardian, an asteroid of this size would not cause a mass extinction like it did with the dinosaurs about 60 million years ago. That asteroid was anywhere between 10 to 15 kilometers wide. Since this oneShane Swan

is only 100 meters wide, it has the potential to cause damage on a city scale taking countless lives. Scientists also say that such an impact would cause an airburst within our atmosphere.

Since the sighting of Asteroid 2024 YR4, two UN-endorsed asteroid response groups have been activated, as well as the International Asteroid Warning Network has made a response and is going to

make further action into the Asteroids flight patterns and uncertainties in its orbit.

The Space Mission Planning Advisory Group has been alerted and could plan to intercept the asteroid with an aircraft.

According to Space.com, space companies say that this asteroid is not cause for immediate concern and some characteristics of this asteroid are still unknown, there could still be factors that could cause greater damage. Astronomers will have a shot at finding these characteristics in 2028 when the asteroid is within the ballpark of 5 million miles.

This asteroid is likely around the same size as the 1908 Tunguska rock, which according to NASA, is

currently the largest recorded asteroid strike event in human history. Even though there are no confirmed fatalities it is said to have knocked over 80 million trees and caused a forest fire that burned many reindeer's, a major source for local tribes. The impact was said to have been recorded by seismographs all the way in

When asking the professor of the astronomy course at Bucks, Michael Babij, he said "Overall, there's no reason to worry right now. The current probability of an impact is slightly over 1%. This is extremely low, although I'm sure people would rather it be at 0% just to be safe. At this point, there's nothing that we

really need to do right now except continue to gather data about the asteroid's size, composition, and orbital path. This orbital path data will help astronomers "fine tune" the probability calculations and the size and composition data can give us a sense of potential impact damage." He also said that "If there was a known object with a probability to strike the Earth, the plans to avoid collision tend to fall into one of two categories: deflect it or blow it up."

It seems that many scientists, and astronomers are not worried about this right now and Asteroid YR4 will remain on the list of potential risk until it comes a bit closer to analyze in 2028.
