



Men's Basketball Make Their Way to the USCAA

Bucks County Community College is extremely proud to announce that our Men's Basketball team has made it to the United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) Division II tournament.

This milestone marks a historic achievement for the program, as this is the first time the Bucks Centurions have earned a spot in the prestigious tournament. Not only did they qualify, but they also made an impressive run, capturing the hearts of fans and showcasing their grit on the national

In Buffalo, N.Y., on March 11 at 12:15 p.m., the tenth-seeded Bucks Centurions faced off against the seventh-seeded Penn State DuBois in a thrilling firstround matchup. The game turned into a dramatic battle that would ultimately go into overtime. With everything on the line, the Centurions rose to the occasion and won 92-89, earning their first-ever victory in the USCAA tournament.

This triumph was an ex-

traordinary feat that no one at Bucks had experienced before. Tyshaun Dukes was a standout in the game, coming off the bench to deliver a dominant performance. Dukes not only recorded a double-double with 24 points, but he also displayed a remarkable ability to crash the boards, with five of those rebounds coming on the offensive glass. His performance was a key factor in keeping the game close and ultimately propelling the team to victory.

The most iconic moment of the game came from Octavio Alexander, whose clutch three-pointer with only two seconds remaining in overtime sealed the win for the Centurions. Alexander finished the game with 20 points and three steals, providing a crucial defensive spark in the second half. His performance exemplified the team's resilience as well as their ability to execute under pressure.

Starting guard Jeremy Henry also had a major impact, contributing with five steals, including four in the first half alone. His defensive tenacity helped disrupt Penn State DuBois's offensive flow and kept the Centurions in the game.

Tyshaun Dukes' offensive explosion in the first half, where he scored 17 points while missing just one shot, played a pivotal role in keeping the team in control for much of the game. The game evolved into a heavyweight boxing match in the second half, with both teams refusing to back down. Penn State DuBois and the Centurions exchanged blows, each team fighting for every point. But when the pressure was at its peak, the Centurions dug deep, remained tough, and pulled out the win, showing their resilience and mental toughness.

Unfortunately, the Centurions' remarkable run came to an end shortly after this thrilling victory. In their next contest, they faced the second-seeded Cincinnati-Clermont and fell 95-79. Despite their best efforts, the Centurions couldn't overcome the higher-seeded team, who had been dominant throughout the season.

suffered another tough loss, 75-62.

Despite the losses in the later rounds, Bucks County Community College's Men's Basketball team demonstrated incredible growth, determination and spirit throughout the tournament and the whole season. Their historic appearance in the USCAA Division II tournament and the victory over Penn State DuBois will remain a high point for the program.

The team has shown that they are capable of competing with the best. The Centurions' performance this season marks the hopeful beginning of a bright future for Bucks Basketball.

Her Tibetan Monk piece, Tibetan Monks Bring Interfaith World Peace Mandala, won first place in both the Feature Photo and Photo Story categories.

Since becoming the Editor in Chief, Castillo's biggest goal for the paper has been "trying to get students more involved in reading the paper or at least picking it up". The staff have worked towards this goal by making additions to the paper such as more photo spreads, an interactive Valentine's Day note booth, and a Saint Pattys Day crossword puzzle.

Castillo says she "would encourage students to join The Centurion because we need to keep news relevant". We not only cover our school's news but our communities as well. "Printed news is important because it offers a community engagement aspect that digital formatting cannot compare to".

Tony Rogers, the college's journalism professor and faculty advisor to the Centurion, said, "I couldn't be more proud of my students. Even after 27 years as a professor here, I'm still amazed by their seemingly boundless energy, creativity and dedication.

World War II Vets Relive Battle of the Bulge

On March 2, 2025, Horsham's NFW Post 9788 & Auxiliary welcomed, Private First-Class Jacob J. Ruser, 100, and Corporal Benjamin Berry, 101, to the 8th Annual "Get Lunch with a Veteran" event in which they detail their early career in the U.S. army, their experience fighting in World War II, and each of their perspectives from fighting in the Battle of the Bulge.

The Battle of the Bulge was fought in a region between Luxembourg and Belgium, that was packed densely with forests, during the worst winter the area has ever seen as detailed by Corporal Berry.

Corporal Berry painted the picture of just how cold it really was during that winter, as he shared that nobody could dig any new foxtrots, instead they would have to use pre-existing ones or just lay down in the snow and hope that either nobody sees you or you don't get hit.

Corporal Berry also stated how the Germans had a major advantage during the battle because of how they made use of the environment around them. German soldiers would paint all their tanks and vehicles used during the Battle of the Bulge white, so they could blend in with the snow that covered the battlefield.

Corporal Berry always carried and cleaned his rifle, but he never was given ammo for it until battle. When entering the Battle of the Bulge, Berry stated how he was given ammo from Uncle Sam and was told to "get out there and show some resistance".

While Corporal Berry was already towards the frontline of the Battle, Private First-Class Ruser and his team would have to find their way towards the frontlines in order to relieve the 98th infantry as they were badly damaged during battle.

It wouldn't be easy to make it to the frontlines, as Ruser and his team were not only coming off a series of bombardments from A.A. guns and tanks throughout the past few days, but it was also a lengthy journey to make it towards the frontlines, especially given the weather conditions.

Ruser's team had to traverse through a 75-footdeep ravine by going into it and climbing back out of it and then had to trek another 1,500 feet towards the battlefield while hoping to not come across any German



soldiers while making their way to the frontline. Thankfully they were able to make it without any major issues.

Both Private Ruser and Corporal Berry had quite a few similarities early on, as both were born and raised in Pennsylvania, both were drafted into the Army straight out of high school, and both had basic training in Illinois, but where they differ is where they were within the army.

Private Ruser specialized as a medic in the army, and because of that he wasn't allowed to carry a firearm, and he wasn't even trained how to handle a firearm, as a medic carrying a weapon would've been in defiance of the Geneva conventions.

On the other hand, Corporal Berry resided in the Combat Arms branch of the army, and although he didn't specify which, it was heavily implied that he was a member in the infantry.

This event, curated by
John Hammerschmidt, was
meant to show appreciation
to all veterans and their
service to this country, and
to keep the history of their
stories and experiences alive
today by sharing it with
younger generations.

VFW Post and Auxiliary's mission is to provide support and programs for Veterans and their family members. The Post and Auxiliary also offer community programs such as the Veterans Lunch, Blood Drives, Car shows, and various fundraisers throughout the year to raise funds to support veterans and the Post.

"We have received donations from staff and faculty, and Bucks CCC alumni," said Greg Luce.


If you are wondering what kind of styles they are looking for, they are looking for business attire that is classic, professional clothing. As long as it is not damaged or stained, it will be accepted.
